LEANING INTO GOD

"Leaning into God" is First Church's theme for 2020-2021. Usually staff will spend the summer planning for a new program year, and the energy is palpable as possibilities are considered of the ways we will put our faith into action for the year. How can our theme help us deepen our faith and bring hope and love to all the people and places in need of it? This year, our responses to God's call will necessarily look different. In these times we are called to be more creative and flexible.

As our program year begins, our community and nation embark on the limited re-opening of schools and allow wider opening of businesses and gatherings. First Church, too, will begin limited in-person worship, with all the appropriate health protocol followed, masked, physical-distanced greeting as we try to keep everyone healthy. The congregation has been divided into groups so that during September and October we can invite all who wish to worship in person to attend at least once in 8 weeks. CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Special Zoom Meeting August 23, 2020

Discussion and action on request for facilities use by Guilford Center for Children

Peter Rebuzzini/Marti Carlson

- Marti Carlson presented Request for use of Church School Building by Guilford Center for Children (GCC) and Before and After School Care (BASC)
- Rooms 1, 4, 5, 8, 9, and Griswold Hall daily, Fellowship Hall on Wednesdays
- 7:00am to 6:00pm
- BASC is in the process of obtaining permission from the state and the town Building and Zoning Department, and has been inspected by the Guilford Fire Marshal and the state inspector from the CT Office of Early Childhood Education (OEC), with no reported concerns. Our local health official has taken a water sample for lead testing and is arranging for a Comprehensive Lead Analysis.
- BASC will follow all protocol and is responsible for cleaning and sanitizing. Teachers will clean every area that is touched, but we will still be responsible for cleaning the hallways.
- All church property: pianos, books, and toys, will be removed from the rooms and placed in unused rooms.
- Pick up and Drop off will be staggered on Broad Street
- BASC Staff will be responsible for locking and unlocking the doors.
- Judi Wallace will move her office to the Minear Library.
- License agreement similar to the Neighborhood Music School without the fees, added COVID rider, insurance is the same.
- Business Committee is 100% in support of this proposal.
- 12 Step Groups that are using our space are meeting on weekends in the Chapel. If we continue with this agreement, we will contact all of the 12 Step groups to let them know the new use and will coordinate a new plan with them if more of the groups need to find a space inside.
- License agreement would go through mid-October, but might be extended, subject to appropriate conditions at the time.
- We can hold a maximum of 60 kids.
- Impact on Mark's duties? He is around, but he will use the same protocol as he does with

Neighborhood Music School (doesn't go on floors between 8am and 5pm).

- Any increased costs will be covered by the Guilford Center for Children. They are providing a community service and we are viewing the use of our building as a community outreach mission.
- Anticipating getting the kids outside for mask breaks. They will not be allowed in the Memorial Garden.
- The GCC Staff will assist the kids with their distance learning while they are at the Church.
- Business Committee has updated WiFi in the building for church purposes, but will also accommodate this program.
- Peter Rebuzzini made the motion to approve and Brian Wiley seconded the agreement. Council approved the community outreach.

Action on Motion for Account at Webster Bank Stephen/Bill Bailey/Mary Jane Potter

- The Church Council of the First Congregational Church of Guilford, CT, voted favorably to approve, for the safekeeping of the Safety Deposit of our new Spencer House Tenant, the establishment of an escrow account at Webster Bank. The tenant started renting the apartment in July 2020.
- Susan Leete made the motion and Brian Wiley seconded. Motion approved. Council authorized Church Treasurer Bill Bailey and Assistant Treasurer Debbie Peluse to establish the account at Webster Bank and to be the Church's signatories for the account.

FIRST CHURCH COVID RESPONSE TEAM

The pandemic has forced changes in the way many Church activities take place. The Grace of God and efforts by many church leaders have allowed First Church to thrive. Nonetheless, in some areas, the current workload is unsustainable. To ensure that we support all of our church family during these days, the First Congregational Church of Guilford, CT hereby establishes a <u>COVID Response Team</u> whose purpose is to support the Church leadership, congregants, and wider Guilford community in addressing the challenges brought on by the ongoing COVID pandemic. Specific responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

- COVID Response Team members will assist Church leadership in outreach and ministry to congregants, particularly those that may be especially impacted by COVID. This may be done in cooperation with Deaconesses, Stewardship, and other committees.
- COVID Response Team members will assist • Church leadership in planning and implementing a transition to in-person worship, as permitted by civil and UCC authorities: including appropriate physical distancing and related procedures to promote health and safety practices. Temperature checks, seating restrictions, and careful management of how congregants enter and leave the sanctuary will likely be required for many months. This may be done in cooperation with the ushers and other committees.
- COVID Response Team members will support Church efforts to minister to the Guilford community impacted by COVID. This may be done in cooperation with the Community and Global Justice committee, and liaison with Christine Cohen and other government officials.

Useful skills for COVID Response Team members: individuals with compassionate communications skills to reach out to individual members and families, and to manage the logistics of restricted inperson services; conduct basic medical screenings. To better understand and interpret public health guidance, the COVID Response Team is looking for persons with a background in health or a high comfort level with COVID related science.

Response Team Term: The COVID Response Team will plan to be active for a two-year period. No later than spring of 2022 First Church Leadership will determine if the team needs to continue or may revise its basic responsibilities based on the needs of the congregation. *Ginger and Jake*

MUSICKING IN A TIME OF PANDEMIC

As many of you know from the news, singing is one activity that is deemed high risk for transmission of coronavirus. Newer scientific studies are figuring out the specifics of why, and what we can do to make singing safe again until there is a vaccine for this virus. Scientists in Colorado and Maryland have new data showing how far aerosols can travel, how some people produce more aerosols, and the difference when making music in large spaces versus small spaces, with or without HVAC systems, as an individual or in a group.

Normally we would start up our choirs in September right after Labor Day. Given the current rates of infection in the United States, given that Guilford will be starting up its attempt at in-person schooling September 10th, and given that church spaces will need to be cleaned and disinfected in-between groups of people using the same spaces, we are delaying the start of our choral music programs (Cherub Choir, Junior Choir, Senior Choir) to October at the earliest.

By October, we will have had a month of in-person worship services. We will have experience with our planned protocols for safety and cleaning. By October, our schools will have found out if their protocols are functioning better than some of the universities that opened and had to close within a week due to coronavirus outbreaks.

By October, we should have a better idea about the feasibility of holding socially-distant rehearsals, either in the church or in another larger space in Guilford. We may be able to use masks that have been specially engineered to allow people to sing while also containing aerosols; by October, there will be more scientific data on the use of these masks in large groups. Many musicians have been spending a lot of time learning about new things: air flow, droplet size, aerosol transmission when singing loudly versus quietly, etc. It comes down to this reality: no matter who you are, we want to make sure that you are safe while participating in a church function, and until we can guarantee that there will be minimal risk from choral singing, we will wait with eager anticipation of a return to making song together. continues

So, in the meantime, how can we still make music? Our virtual worship services have featured a bunch of soloists and small ensembles so far; we still have many opportunities for those of you who would like to play or sing for worship. We will also be organizing some small instrumental ensembles for September.

This summer I've arranged several pieces for handbells, in a way that no bells are shared between players. For these ensembles, we will be able to play on separate stations spaced a good social distance apart. We also have a set of pitched percussion (xylophones, metallophones) and drums that can be used in a socially-distant percussion group.
