not on the litter."
Though I lack the art
to decipher it,
no doubt the next chapter
in my book of transformations
is already written.
I am not done with my changes.

As the calendar flips to the idea of a hope-filled year, we are still changing. Even weighed down, many venture forward as people more aware of injustice, privilege, and need. We step out into a new year, layered with a loss from the last and share a cup of kindness as community to rebuild.



CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS December 8, 2020

Treasurer Report: Bill Bailey

- Carrying a surplus much of which is because of the Payroll Protection Plan loan. We are at 94% of the pledged Ministries Fund.
- Second Trustee distribution came through and is added to the Miscellaneous Fund Contributions.
- Have been approved for the Payroll Protection Plan loan forgiveness \$76,000. Only owe \$8,000 for the EIDL (second loan). See below for repayment.

Board of Finance: Larry Backes

 Will meet in early January to compare the projected budget with the Stewardship numbers.

Funding sabbatical fund: S. Dudley/B. Bailey

 There have not been proper payments going into the sabbatical fund. No explanation discovered. Underfunded by about \$12,000 over the past couple of years. Motion made and approved to fund the sabbatical funds now.

Discussion of PAJ request: Gay Harter

 Presenting resolution which comes from UCC Palestine/Israel Network. UCC hoping to present at General Synod next summer if enough churches accept the resolution. Motion made and approved.

Discussion of Federal loan payback: Bill Bailey

 Repayment of the EIDL loan. Bill wants to payback right away. Motion made and approved to pay back loan right away.

Discussion of payments to nursery employees:

Stephen Dudley/Judi Wallace

 Motion made and approved to give both of the Nursery workers \$200 before Christmas.

- Moving forward with expansion of driveway at Spencer House.
- Asked Historic District Commission about expanding the church parking lot, but there were concerns, so we are rethinking that idea.
- Last month we approved housing Guilford Center for Children for another month. Motion made and approved to allow GCC to use our space through the spring.
- Neighborhood Music School hasn't responded to requests, so we don't think NMS needs our space at this time.
- Hoping to keep windows open and services going so Sunday sexton Carlo can stay employed. We will keep services going with windows open down to 35 degree temperature.

Nominating: Gail Tomsich/ Peter Rebuzzini

- Working hard to call and fill the slate of committee members for the January Church Council meeting and then the Annual Meeting.
- Thanks to Nominating Committee for their hard work. Church Council is supposed to nominate and add two people to the Nominating Committee each year. *Homework:* come to January meeting with a couple of names each. Stephen will call the list to get the new committee members.

DEACON DIGEST

The new year brings an invitation to consider ourselves and our faith journeys anew. And, this year, the concurrent introduction of vaccines for the coronavirus has sharpened that effect, setting it into relief.

With the newfound hope of reunion comes a sense of retrospection about what we've been through and what has changed. A lot? Nothing? It's still difficult to say for many of us, but the questions linger. Yes, the pandemic has separated us from one another physically and even from the space of our church, but it has also multiplied opportunities for reflection and openness to change.

As we strive to lean into God this year, prayer and scripture can help, focusing attention and offering starting points for self-examination. When I joined the deacons in 2019, Ginger encouraged us to focus our attention on scripture and to bring it into our daily lives and our service to the church.

After 2020, I feel profound gratitude for that guidance. I sometimes feel like a different person reading scripture, especially in the past few months. Every passage seems new and means something different. Just yesterday, it was Jesus' forty days in the wilderness in the Book of Matthew. As we (eventually) reach the end of our isolation, how will we face the challenges of a return to "normal?"

I'm simultaneously reminded of my favorite pandemic podcast, The Happiness Lab. It revolves around the reality that we often undermine our own happiness. Laurie Santos, the host, invites listeners to learn about and perhaps embrace some of the many small habits of mind and activity that lead to greater happiness and fulfillment in life. Gratitude, of course, plays a recurring role.

As we look ahead to the new year and the gradual return of our community life in person, I pray that we will each find renewed meaning and value in exploring our relationships with God and one another, taking conscious steps toward happiness, understanding, and love.

STEWARDSHIP UPDATE:

We are grateful for the response thus far to the Stewardship drive to fund our Ministry Budget for 2021, and are excited as we await the latest gifts to be made.

CREATION JUSTICE CHURCH COVENANT

Led by our ministers, church leadership and the Environmental Ministry Team over the last 10 years, FCCG has progressed through all three levels of becoming a UCC "Green Church" sanctioned by our UCC Conference, and recently, also Connecticut's interdenominational Interreligious Eco-Justice Network (IREJN), part of Interfaith Power and Light, the national faith-based environmental advocacy group. Our progress has included the following: new windows and/or insulation; replacing an inefficient oil-fired heating system; installing LED lighting; placing 74 solar panels on our roof, which produce almost 30 MWh of clean electricity, some of which is even fed back into the utility "grid"; a large organic garden providing food to local foodbanks; and steps taken to reduce and eliminate our use of plastic, polystyrene and other non-biodegradable and non-compostable materials.

Over the last several years, the Environmental Ministry Team, along with the Peace Affirmation and Justice Committee and the Board of Community and Global Justice and other committees with Church Council support, have intentionally led our now "Green Church" congregation to critical thinking socioeconomic dimensions about the environmental justice, such as race, class and inequality. Our ministers and guest preachers have preached sermons about climate change and justice, and we have had after-church speakers, book study groups, and participated in youth forums, advocacy actions, marches and visits to and outreach to our elected leaders about humankind's highest calling: to care for Creation and to seek justice for the oppressed and for those who have suffered from environmental racism at the local, state, national and global levels. Recently FCCG signed on to the UCC's Congregation Climate Voter Challenge to encourage our members to take the Creation Care Voter Pledge and to think about Creation care whenever they vote.

For our 2021 Annual Meeting, the Environmental Ministry has proposed that the congregation consider and adopt the following **Creation Justice Church Covenant**:

We, the people of First Congregational Church, Guilford, Connecticut, commit ourselves, as individuals and as a congregation, to the intertwined responsibilities to care for Creation and to seek justice for the poor, the marginalized, and the oppressed. With resolve, we commit ourselves with an awareness of how the abuses of Creation and chance inevitably cause human suffering and of how factors such as race, class, and global inequality cause some to suffer more than others. We dedicate ourselves to this urgent calling, as humanity confronts the current and future crisis of damage to our climate. We desire that these deeply felt commitments be reflected in all the dimensions of our congregation's life. We covenant to take ourselves beyond the walls of this church to uphold our promise to God, our Creator, to Jesus, the Redeemer of Creation, and to the Holy Spirit, the Sustainer of Creation, to be faithful stewards of this Creation.

We hope that you will consider and support this statement of our interconnectedness with all people and earthly animals and our movement toward right relationships among and with all God's Creation and permanently establish Creation Justice as an integral strand in the DNA of FCCG.

Cards may be purchased and donated to the church for Ginger and Jake to distribute to those with food insecurity. ECO Echo

On a beautiful blue-skied December 3, members of the church's Environmental Ministry presented their first Annual Green Certificate of Appreciation Award to long-time church member Cindy Magee in her front yard. Masked members Sue Jones, Susan Arnold and Nancy and Jon Leckerling were present to give Cindy her certificate which recognized her for her many years of organizing the church Rummage Sale and for setting the example of recycling, reusing and repurposing goods that people donate to the sale. Susan Arnold created and presented to Cindy a beautiful evergreen wreath, which was decorated with lovely white waxed 3-D stars that Sue Jones crafted. Nancy presented Cindy with an aqua-colored cashmere throw from the EMT to keep her warm this winter. Cindy's son Kevin attended as well as Jon Leckerling, who snapped photos.

Cindy and the church Women's Fellowship group started the Rummage Sale in the early 1980s. In 2019 two seasonal sales on the first weekends of October and April, raised \$2800. Each year the sale, on average takes in \$1000. Following a goal to resue rather than discard, people are invited to donate things they no longer want or need and to sell these items at a reduced price for people who cannot afford to pay more. Fifteen to twenty members of the Women's Fellowship participate and prepare for the sales.

Over the years, the proceeds from these sales have been used to purchase the china and silverware for the church kitchen, the long rectangular tables and tablecloths in Fellowship Hall, which are used for the sales, and benches for the church school. Funds from the 2019 sale were donated toward the sanctuary's sound system and each year to our church's Christmas Tree gift card mission. Donations are also given to Meals on Wheels, the Heating Energy Fund and The Food Bank of Guilford Social Services, and to Habitat for Humanity of Greater New Haven. Leftover items from sales have been given to missions in New Haven, such as Christian Community Action and Goodwill, and to

Africa, through mission connections of church members there. Leftover books are given to the Guilford Free Library. Congratulations to Cindy and the Women's Fellowship for their hard work and dedication to recycling, reusing and repurposing and to supporting missions of our church and beyond.
