"Creating Space to ... Mend"

First Church's theme for the 2021-2022 program year is "Creating Space to ... Mend." After months of lockdown, and a year and a half of pandemic we all feel varying degrees of cabin fever and perhaps a little claustrophobic. One of the things we have counted on at First Church during difficult times - being able to gather in community – is fraught, and many have felt a little lost. We have tried different ways in worship, in music, in education and fellowship to allow us to gather safely to feel connected in spirit, if not always in body. Regardless many still feel isolated and disconnected from our faith community. This pandemic time has torn part of the fabric of our church family.

To help mend the sense of community which is an integral part of the tapestry that is First Church, we will focus this year on creating space – intentional, safe, sacred space. Any time that requires us to do things in new ways - creative work - requires space for possibilities to emerge. The same is true of grief: we need time and space to discern what the loss means, and allow the caterpillar to form a chrysalis to emerge as something new. We grieve what has been lost in the pandemic– loved ones, financial/business stability, dreams & possibilities, and the list goes on. But there has been some new life as well: new projects, businesses and new ways of doing things have emerged, and kindnesses abound – people helping neighbor and those far away.

This year we invite you to create space for yourself, your family – and we will create space for our faith community. In that space, we will focus on mending ourselves individually, as well as lovingly repair the tapestry that is First Church. We will make space to worship, to allow Scripture to inspire us, to pray, to let music move us, to explore ways for children and youth and adults to grow in faith, to make space for safe ways of fellowship—to sit and listen for God's guidance.

MUSIC MINISTRIES: SINGING IN A TIME OF COVID

Adult Choir - Our first fall rehearsal will be Thursday, Sept. 9th, gathering at 7:15pm in the sanctuary. In late spring 2021, the CDC approved singing indoors without masks for vaccinated people, and our vaccinated singers who felt comfortable returned to the choir room and started making music together again without masks. We were even able in June to host in worship the Connecticut Gay Men's Chorus. However, due to the infectivity of the latest SARS-Cov2 variants, and the rise in 'breakthrough' infections of vaccinated people, the CDC now recommends mask usage indoors even for people who have been vaccinated, and that applies to singers. Mask-wearing while singing is not fun: it's hard to enunciate and make yourself heard through layers of cloth or paper. It's also harder to hear other singers when you're sitting further apart. Sadly, since August 2nd, Connecticut has been back at "high" instead of "medium" COVID risk. Until we get the okay from the CDC, and until Connecticut's new COVID cases subside to "medium" risk levels, we'll need to have curtailed singing for choir and congregation. Normally choir rehearsals last from 7:15 to 9:00pm; our fall 2021 rehearsals will be no more than 30 minutes. People who wish to sing with the choir must be vaccinated; masks must be worn inside the building at all times. Rehearsals will be in the sanctuary instead of the choir room, to permit greater distancing.

Cherub and Junior Choirs will resume meeting after school on Wednesdays beginning Sept. 15th, with great leadership from directors Dawn Perotti and Nancy Kelly. Junior Choir is held after school until 5:00pm in Fellowship Hall, and Cherub Choir is held 4:00 - 5:00pm in Griswold Hall. In response to the pandemic, we'll modify our program to keep kids safe: less singing, more speech chants and instruments, and other non-contact group activities. Look for details in the Christian Education weekly newsletter.

I know that there will be many singers who will (wisely) decide to wait to return to choral singing. It is clear at this time that any in-person events have some minimal risk, even to the vaccinated, and that singing increases that risk because of the breathing in and breathing out required to sing. I'm still vacillating about this decision to sing or not to sing, not only because of the medical risk from new variants: it doesn't feel right knowing that our musical community is being fractured into "people willing to risk singing" vs "people who don't feel safe singing at this time." If Guilford sees a surge in 'breakthrough' cases, especially as children return to

in-person schooling, we will suspend rehearsals until it's safer. If Connecticut moves back to "critical" COVID risk, rehearsals will also be suspended. But, for the fall, we'll see how many singers feel comfortable with the precautions we will be taking and will try to bring some small ensemble music periodically back to worship. DEACON DIGEST

Recently I took this photo of this common, unremarkable dandelion which has been relegated to the inauspicious category of weeds. Yet each little parachute of fluff is carefully and wonderfully



made. There are over 100 species throughout the world. If you zoom in on the photo, it reveals many different colors—pinks, blues, yellows—as well as patterns which point to an undeniable creative "order." On a closer look, this humble weed surely points to the mind of a master creator.

Pondering the wonders of this dandelion put me in mind of a familiar Bible verse: "So why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin; and yet I say to you that even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. Now if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is, and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will He not much more clothe you..." (Matthew 6).

When Jesus spoke he often used illustrations from nature to help them understand what God is like—things that everyone could relate to, such as trees, sheep, rocks, stars, lilies and grass. If God can take care of billions of blades of grass and countless dandelions, which are here today and gone tomorrow, how much more will God take care of us?

There is a phrase, "the devil is in the details" ... well, actually, God is in the details. What does it say about God that God creates such a common plant with such meticulous detail? What does it say about how God regards us? May the wonders of creation move us to faith in the One who knows our needs even before we ask, and who loves us more than our hearts can imagine. "Therefore, do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble."

Antal was the Conference Minister and President of the Massachusetts UCC Conference 2006 - 2018 and now serves as the Special Advisor on Climate Justice to the UCC's General Minister and President in Cleveland. Jim will also help us work through what we as individuals and FCCG, can do to help preserve our planet.

UCC 33RD GENERAL SYNOD RECAP JULY 11-18, 2021

Instead of traveling to Kansas City for the biennial UCC General Synod this year, 715 delegates and 2,000 visitors gathered online for the first time for a week of inspiring worship, motivational speakers, more than 50 workshops, lively debates about and votes on resolutions put forth by UCC congregations across the country and watching our UCC polity "in action".

I "attended" Synod, whose theme was "Rooted in Love", eight days and found it to be a rich learning experience! All week, we contemplated the question "what does rooted in God's love look like?" when played out in our congregations as a response to what's going on in the world. Rev. Ben Chavis, former UCC President, preached at the opening worship about the intersection of faith, justice and love, and the core of his impassioned message was that the only real answer to all the problems we face is a religious, spiritual one.

The three awesome keynote speakers during the week were: Valerie Kaur, filmmaker, civil rights lawyer, Sikh activist and author (whose book <u>See No Stranger</u> I bought and can't wait to read) who provided us with a "revolutionary love compass" a guide to help the U.S. transition into a "multi-racial democracy"; Rev. Adam Russell Taylor, Executive Director of Global Justice for Sojourners, who urged "beloved community" as an antidote to the "twin viruses" of systemic racism and toxic polarization; and Dr. Joy DeGruy, author, speaker and social scientist, who laid out a program for uncovering racism and "unleashing repair".

Eleven important resolutions were presented, discussed in hearings, and voted on by the delegates. Those passed by the Synod assembly included: A Resolution on the Rights of Nature (I will report more on this in the October Landmark); a Resolution to Declare Racism a Public Health Crisis; a Resolution for a Just Peace Between Palestine and Israel; a Resolution to Ban Conversion Therapy; A Resolution for the UCC to Become a Church of Contemplatives in Action; and a Resolution to Recognize the United Nations International Decade for People of African Descent (2015-2024). We heard some powerful preachers and sang some wonderful hymns including "Rooted and Grounded in Love", "Break Up Your Fallowed Ground" and "Sing a New World Into Being", which I hope we can sing in our church!

Our UCC General Minister and President Rev. Dr. John C. Dorhauer stated in his comprehensive "state of the church" address that he serves a denomination "on the move" to be a body fully committed to a love that seeks a just world for all. He urged us to turn our grief related to the pandemic and environmental racism into hope and action and our death into "new life".

My favorite workshop of the many I attended was "Rooted and Rising: Voices of Courage in a Time of Climate Crisis" and was offered up by Rev. Dr. Jim Antal. Leah Schade, Rev. Dr. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas and Natasha De Jarnett, authors who all have essays in the book with the same title. Using top of the line videographers, audio technicians, editors, and musicians, this amazing Synod was planned all year by a team of creative, bold, and inspiring designers and most everything went off without a glitch. Pretty impressive!

Synod took time to celebrate and welcome new UCC congregations in Texas, Michigan, Indiana and California to our denomination. The very gifted Rev. Traci Blackmon was nominated and elected as the Associate General Minister of the UCC.

Lastly, one of my favorite parts of Synod, besides its accessibility for us all and getting to "see" clergy colleagues from all over the U.S., was "getting to know" the very gifted leaders of our denomination in the national setting in Cleveland--General Minister Dorhauer, Associate General Minister Blackmon, Minister of Environmental Justice Rev. Dr. Brooks Berndt, and Rev. Velma Love, Minister of Social Justice. Rev. Love, in her speech, said something that continues to replay in my mind this past month: "We've resisted the changes that would have brought us to racial equity. Let's hope this time we are in it to win it." For me, the whole Synod week was indeed "rooted in love", and I came away proud to be a member of the United Church of Christ.

The next General Synod will be held in the summer of 2023 in Indianapolis with hopes that the pandemic will be past, and delegates can gather in person again. I hope to be there!
